Olds College Dual Credit Courses (3 CTS credits for each course). High school students see your guidance counselor or principal for application forms and for detailed information about each course. Tuition is covered by the Dual Credit Project.









Entrepreneurship Certificate Online Courses (Continuing Education at Olds College)

These online courses are offered through the Continuing Education department at Olds College. Each course is offered online and is asynchronous, meaning you can do it at any time during the day over the months in which it is scheduled.

Entrepreneurship Essentials (ENT 6000) Sept 14-Dec 18,

2015 This course will provide a broad introduction to entrepreneurship. Using the gamified iPad application "Spirit of Entrepreneurship", students will learn to recognize the factors associated with successful entrepreneurship including various business models, a marketing plan, financial tools and human resource requirements for a small enterprise. In addition to minigames and awards, students to move through 12 modules of comprehensive content. As they progress through the content, more activities are unlocked in the game. As students become more skilled, they are able to run their stands more effectively and profitably. Students are required to assess their business environment, make financial decisions, and apply marketing strategies within the game itself. Must have access to an iPad and internet. (High School credit in ENT 1010, ENT 1020, ENT 2010, ENT 2020, ENT 2030)

Financial Literacy (ENT 6001) Sept 14-Dec 18, 2015

This course provides an overview of financial literacy concepts critical to being a successful entrepreneur, small business owner or non-profit enterprise. Topics will include: Effective management of personal finance techniques, an overview of how small businesses track financial transactions, gain access to capital, evaluate investment options and develop financial donation strategies. (High school credit in FIN 1010, FIN 3080, FIN 3090, FIN 3910)

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Dual Credit Program-Meat Processing Certificate FULL TIME PROGRAM September 2-December 16, 2015

7:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. daily (hours per day may vary).

The Olds College Meat Processing certificate is a fifteen week program and provides sound basic skills in meat cutting, slaughter, food safety, HACCP, sanitation procedures and value-added processed meat and sausage production. This innovative program focuses on practical, hands-on training in an environment designed to match what you will find at work.

High school students will earn 15 CTS credits for this

program, as follows:

This program is part of the Dual Credit Project (students will also earn high school CTS credits). High school students, see your guidance counselor or principal for application packages. Tuition is paid for by the Dual Credit Pilot Project. Students will be required to pay for their own personal supplies (approximately \$600.00).







So You Love Horses (EQN 1100)

September 21 to December 11, 2015.

So You Love Horses is a basic introduction to the horse, horse care, and horse handling. You will understand the biology of the horse both as an evolving mammal and as a domesticated partner for work and play. Basic equine identification, terminology, behaviours, anatomy and horse breeds are examined. Safe ground handling techniques, stable management, nutrition, reproduction, and grooming are covered.

So You Love Horses is offered online on the student's own time (no set schedule), with one hands-on lab session held at Olds College on Friday November 6, 2015.

- Students must take AGR 3000 (Agriculture Safety) through their high school to receive credit in So You Love Horses.
- Students must have regular access to a horse.
- Students must have computer access to high speed internet for this course.

These courses are part of the Dual Credit Pilot Project (students will also earn three high school CTS credits: AGR 2070, 3070 and AGR 3950). High school students, see your guidance counselor or principal for application packages. Tuition is paid for by the Dual Credit Project. Students are responsible for any transportation required for the course.







Red Deer College Dual Credit Courses-Instructions for Students and Parents

Use this as your Application Checklist

Step 1: INFORMATION GATHERING

- Read the enclosed "Information for Students" for the dual credit courses available in the next semester. Read the information sheet carefully; taking on a college course requires extra commitment.
- Interested students and parents meet with a school counselor and/or administrator to gain an understanding of the dual credit course or program and how it can fit in the student's career path.
- You may want to research the related career possibilities by checking out the Alberta Learning Information Service (ALIS) website http://alis.alberta.ca/. Click on the High School Students section to access a wide variety of information. Learning more about related careers before you apply will help you to make the most of your course and it will also help you be successful in an interview with the college, if one is required.

Step 2: APPLICATION

- Obtain the required application package and any assistance needed to complete the package from your high school counselor and/or administrator.
- Your high school counselor and/or administrator will forward your completed application package to the dual credit coordinator for CESD.

Your application submission includes:

- Red Deer College Dual Credit Application Form (*read carefully and make sure you've completed all sections*. <u>You must include a current e-mail address</u>.)
- Sky Wings Aviation Application Form
- o Current High School Course Mark Status

Step 3: NOTIFICATION AND ORIENTATION

- Students are accepted into the courses on a "first qualified, first served" basis. Completing all parts of the application package and submitting the package on time is very important.
- Students will be notified of acceptance into the course or program by Red Deer College and a wait list may be established. If the course is full or if there is not enough room, you may not be able to get into the course.
- The cost of tuition is covered by dual credit project funds. All costs for materials and for any travel to Red Deer College or Sky Wings Aviation are the responsibility of the student/parent.
- Red Deer College and Sky Wings Aviation instructors provide information on student progress directly to the student. Final marks are provided to the high school at the end of the course.

Information for Students Considering Aviation and Red Deer College Management Certificate Dual Credit Courses through Distance Learning

Why Management? The Management Certificate provides basic business skills leading to management positions within an organization. The certificate also provides opportunities to further advance your studies at RDC in the field of business (from diplomas in management, marketing, financial services, or accounting to a 4 year Bachelor of Business Administration degree). This dual credit opportunity allows high school students to complete a portion of the full certificate while still in high school and is part of the <u>Sky Wings Aviation partnership with Red Deer College</u>. The combination of business classes and aviation training is the first step for professional pilot career or aviation management related careers.

What hardware/material do I need to participate in the Management Certificate courses?

- A computer with internet access.
- A headset with a microphone for synchronous class discussions.
- Some courses may require a webcam or smartphone for capturing work and/or a course textbook with online
 access.

Where do I need to go to complete the Management Certificate online courses?

- The courses in the program are completely online. They can be completed from your high school or your home. Each course will have some synchronous components scheduled once or twice per week in the evening.
- Midterms and final exams will need to be completed in a supervised location at your high school.

What courses are available to me in high school?

- There are seven Management Certificate courses available to high school students listed on the next page.. Students apply for the business courses using the RDC Dual Credit Application Form.
- Students apply for the Sky Wings Aviation Ground School Training on a separate application form provided through the high school.

What else do I need to know?

- You need to be prepared for the rigors of college courses and Sky Wings Aviation Ground School Training. For example, it is expected that you will meet the same standards as all students taking the course.
- For every one hour of class in the Management Certificate courses, you are expected to work at least one hour outside of class. Therefore, a three hour class will require at least three hours of additional work time.
- The cost of tuition for the RDC courses are covered by dual credit project funds. The program fee for Sky Wings Aviation is waived for high school dual credit students. Textbooks for the Sky Wings Ground School training (approximately \$375.00) and for the online business courses (approximately \$150.00/course) are the responsibility of the students/parents.
- If you complete the entire Management Certificate, you can go on to further education at Red Deer College, such as the Financial Services Diploma and the Business Administration Diploma.

If this program sounds like it fits with your goals and your pathway:

- 1. You need to check with your school counselor or administrator to make sure that you are eligible to take the courses. Once you are approved by your high school, you need to get your parents' permission and complete the application forms. The application form, your written statement of intent, and a Course Mark Inquiry is forwarded by your high school guidance counselor to the Director of Learning, CLC.
- 2. If a course is full or if there are not enough registrations, there is a chance that you will not be able to get the course you want this semester.
- 3. You will receive notification from RDC and from Sky Wings Aviation once you are accepted into the course or courses.

Management Certificate Information:

Students are encouraged to take one Management Courses of their choice in a semester, and sign up for the Ground Training with Aviation Training at a time that works well for them. **The full Management Certificate consists of 4 core courses and 4 option courses**. More information about the full certificate can be found <u>here</u>. Students may want to take the program requirements into consideration when choosing the dual credit courses.

Sky Wings Aviation Ground School Information:

The Program: Students are encouraged to take one Management Courses of their choice in a semester, and sign up for the Ground Training with Aviation Training at a time that works well for them during the 2015-2016 school year. The Sky Wings program follows Transport Canada curriculum and runs over 3 weeks. You can expect to dedicate approximately 75 hours total time to complete the training requirements. Students who successfully complete the program will receive 3 high school credits in Aviation 35, a Locally Developed Course approved by Alberta Education.

Ground school commences the second week of each month and is held on Tuesday/Thursday evenings and Saturdays. Please indicate the month that you would like to sign up for on the Sky Wings Application Form. If you would like to know specific dates, please call the Sky Wings Aviation office at 403-886-5191.

Application Process: Students must complete the Sky Wings Aviation application form and submit it to their high school who will forward it on to Sky Wings Aviation. Sky Wings Aviation will contact the student regarding acceptance into the program.

Pre-Requisites: Students in Grades 11 and 12 are eligible for this program, and must have **HCS 3000** from their high school prior starting the training at Sky Wings Aviation. Students/parents are responsible for all transportation to Sky Wings Aviation for the duration of the training.
